CLUB NIGHT THURSDAY

The evening is a demonstration of printing given by Mike Elliston and Peter Hathaway, It will give members the opportunity of getting a much better understanding of printing with alternative printers. If you are considering LocoScript 4 and the colour printing feature, this evening will give you the chance to get to know the details and what is available. It is not necessary to bring your own machines.

Chairman's Chatterings

On a number of occasions in the past I have asked members who live locally why they did not attend the club night on the first Thursday of the month. The reply has been that they didn't realise that the new month had started and that the first Thursday had already gone by. In addition, there are some months when we have a demonstration with one or two machines at the front and. invariably, someone brings along their PCW and it sits in its carrier all night. Conversely, when we do have a tutorial night, people forget to bring along their computer and they have to huddle around behind someone else. watching over their shoulder instead of getting the hands-on experience they want.

Because of this we have decided to mail out the Newsletter to all members before the monthly meeting, rather than hand it out to attendees on the night and send it out to postal members and others during that month as at present. This will remind local members that a meeting is coming up and whether they need to bring along a PCW and/or other equipment. Do remember that when you are recommended to bring along your machine you should bring your CP/M and LocoScript Start-of-Day discs too; the vast majority of programs for the PCW run under CP/M so your CP/M discs are essential to run these.

There is the added advantage that our Membership Secretary will not have to run through the members' database ticking off those who did attend before he can send the Newsletter out to the others. I do realise that mailing out the Newsletter will cost the club a little more in postage but that should be offset by the extra numbers that turn up on the night. Don't forget that postal members are always welcome to come along to club

nights too; we have had visitors in the past from Sussex and Surrey, Berkshire and Cambridge, Suffolk and Norfolk, so please feel free to pop in and see us if you are in the vicinity. Even if work takes you to London for a few days its only 35 minutes from Fenchurch Street and you can see the Basildon Centre from Basildon Station, less than two minutes away.

The next club night is on Thursday 5th March at 7.30 pm and the talk is called Looking Good in Print, how to improve the output from your printer. There is no need to bring anything along for this meeting except, of course, yourself. If you have any queries on how to use your printer for more effective output this is the time to ask. Peter Hathaway and I will be demonstrating a colour printer among other issues and this is where I should like some feedback from our members including postal members.

You all know by now that you can use a colour printer with Locoscript 4 but you have to be careful which one you choose. A large number of modern printers are designed to work almost exclusively with Windows on a PC (or occasionally an Apple Macintosh) and all the fonts and settings are controlled by Windows drivers built into that PC program. There are no dip switches or other means of controlling the hardware mechanically.

LocoScript Software have produced printer drivers for some 600 or 700 printers, an impressive undertaking considering the dwindling market for the PCW. Of these about 27 are listed as being capable of printing in colour from within Locoscript 4. Now I have no shares in either LocoScript or Epson but I can wholeheartedly recommend the Epson Stylus 600 Colour printer. If this is too expensive for you ensure that whatever

you buy has a separate black cartridge (or ribbon) from the colour cartridge (or ribbon) otherwise you may find that black is a combination of the colours and (a) comes out as a muddy purple but (b) uses up the expensive coloured ink that more quickly.

I have an old Epson LO2500 24-pin dot matrix printer fitted with a colour kit, using a multi-striped ribbon and I've managed to get this to print in colour under LocoScript 4 but setting it up as an Epson LO 150 Colour printer. This works in download mode only (with the LX fonts) but if used in standard mode the Carriage Return doesn't work correctly and lines print one on top of the other. Still I'm perfectly happy with using the LX fonts anyway. Conversely David has a Commodore printer which, according to the manufacturer, is intended to emulated the Hewlett Packard 500C. It may well do so when running under Windows but under LocoScript 4 it only prints in black. This is no fault of LocoScript Software; their printer

driver does run the HP 500C in colour. However the Commodore only *emulates* the 500C; it is not identical to the 500C and that is where the problem lies. Do not go for a printer that says it *emulates* one on the LocoScript colour printer drivers list; buy one that is on that list.

This is where you all can help. Can you please send me details of any printer that you have managed to get to print in colour and what LocoScript printer driver/s you used to get it working. Did it work perfectly in all modes or, as my LQ2500C, only in download (using the LX fonts) or only in standard (using the printer's own built-in fonts? We can then publish a list of matching printers and drivers that others can use in the future. In addition, have you a colour printer that is supposed to emulate a listed printed but simply doesn't? Will it not print in colour or will it not work at all? Share your experiences with all-please.

The initial copies of these magazines are very difficult to obtain in fact almost impossible.
