#### Chairman's Chatterings

Forenames have their fashions; someone named George is *likely* to be over 60 (but not necessarily so!) whilst a Wayne will be in his thirties or forties. When I was at school there were seventeen Michaels in a class of thirty-five so surnames were used without question it wasn't an insult, it was simply practical.

The name Adrian must have been in fashion at some point not too long ago for, in this PCW fraternity, we have two making a name for themselves, and needless to say, in the last Newsletter, I got them muddled up. I credited Adrian Hooper, who hails from Radstock near Bath with running the Strad team and producing PCW Today. I probably insulted the real organiser of the excellent PCW Today. Adrian Braddy from Middlesbrough Teesside. Apologies to both! Incidentally. Adrian Hooper's own Radstock.pcw Newsletter is quite an interesting read, too, and from a one-man show I suspect. Thanks to both for the efforts they make in keeping the PCW world active.

Wouldn't it be nice to have that brilliant design you've just created in MicroDesign (or any of the other PCW drawing packages) on the front of a tee-shirt or sweatshirt? Well here's a way you can do it for yourself at home without too much bother. Print out the design in high quality at the required size onto the centre of an A4 sheet (using a good black ribbon, if dot matrix) and get a couple of good photocopies of this print.

Then make up a mixture of two parts water to one part white spirits or turps in a bottle, shake well, add a drop of detergent or washing-up liquid and shake well again. Put

the photocopy face down on a clean impervious surface and liberally brush first the back and then the front of the paper with the mixture (but not so hard as to smear the image)...

Heat up an old (clean) metal tray with an iron and slide it *inside* the (pre-washed) teeshirt. Place the wet photocopy face down in the required position on the front of the teeshirt (with the hot tray inside) and roll with a hard wallpaper roller until the image transfers onto the cloth (as it will). The image can be *fixed* by spraying it with fixing spray from an arts and crafts shop.

It might be advisable to experiment first on an old handkerchief or the inside of a pillowcase until you perfect the technique but quite good results can be obtained by this simple method. It will work with certain types of laser printer (depending on the volatility of the toner used and the temperature of the corona wire). What might be far more impressive is to try a colour photocopy of an image created with one of the new colour printers - multi-colour images are simpler now with LocoScript4!

Remember though, if vour design incorporates *lettering*, the text on photocopy must be reversed to get rightreading words on the cloth. You can either "flip" your MD3 image by copying it onto itself with the corners switched before you save and print it, or you can make the first photocopy onto clear film, flip the film image, and photocopy it again in reverse. Both methods will work.

The club logo is available in the club's PD library held by Nick Chaundy, so now you can create your own British Amstrad PCW Club tee-shirt to wear and advertise the Club. Enjoy!
