PcwToday

Adrian Braddy is back on course with his excellent PCW magazine PcwToday which arrived on the doormat a few days ago. The emphasis in this issue is Get emailing (although I refuse to use the at symbol @ for the lowercase letter 'a' as appears too frequently nowadays and is used on the front cover). Adrian has acquired the new Amstrad e-mailer and is well pleased with this latest product from the Alan Sugar stable.

News items include mention of David Lander's Instant Recall 3 spreadsheet for use within LocoMail and LocoFile. Steve has a pre-production copy of this and will be reviewing it shortly in the *Disc Drive*.

The new address details of Three Inch Software given here appeared in the Newsletter 79 a few months ago.

The News page also gives early details of a *PCW Explorer* package from the brilliant programmer John Elliot of *Joyce* fame (the PCW emulator for the PC). The program 'enables the PC to read PCW graphics'. There is a free download of the package (version 0.01) on John's website: www.seasip.demon.co.uk (and not as printed in PcwToday).

Instant Recall 3

There is a full page review of Instant Recall 3, but only the prototype version. For those who prefer to use the LocoScript family for everything they do, this adds a spreadsheet to the suite, albeit limited in size and capability.

The PCW is featured on a number of sites on the Internet and, in a guide to the 'top web sites', PcwToday heads the list followed by 16 Storm (for the PcW16),

Joyce (from Germany), Amstrad and Locomotive Software. I would also have included John King's PcwKing and John Elliot's Seasip site (mentioned earlier) among others.

The Club Scene listing now includes more computer clubs than PCW clubs (and a number that no longer exist) but that, unfortunately, is the way things are heading nowadays. The moment that anyone suggests that this club should cater for PCs too is the day I shall be out of the door.

For those who dread the day that their PCW drive starts to falter, Ron King provides a run-down on how to replace the drive band on a 3" drive. This could be the only thing that will prevent your PCW from going on for a lot, lot longer. Perhaps you should get a spare band now?

Amstrad e-mailer

A double page spread reviews the new Amstrad e-mailer at length; for those who want no more than simple e-mailing capabilities this may be just the answer. You can print out your e-mails but, as yet, there is no way to save them to disc or other medium. Adrian is delighted with his new toy and so are a number of readers.

Mike Saunders reviews a new product from Don Moody for the PcW16, a tutorial on desktop publishing, some extra borders, etc, which retails for £10 but omits to say from where this may be obtained. I failed to find an advertisement for the product elsewhere in the magazine either.

The LocoScript tutorial delves into the use of the Template.Std file to simplify the production of routine letters. I am amazed how many people *still* set up the page, margins, fonts and layout for a letter every time they start a new document. Kathleen Thorpe demystifies the subject.

File Compression

The centre spread of the magazine is a very interesting article from David Landers on the history and use of file compression techniques, first developed by Richard Greenlaw in the CP/M environment some twenty years ago. I am not going to attempt to precis the article save to say that if you are interested in the subject the magazine is worth a subscription for this essay alone. I would agree with those who say that, with the diminishing costs of discs, file compression is no longer so important but if you come across a file with a Q or a Z in the extension this may well help you solve the puzzle and extract the content.

Kathleen Thorpe goes down Memory Lane to take a nostalgic look at some of the earlier programs which used to be available for the PCW. Kathleen also translates a number of the terms used in the printing and publishing trade. However 'set' is the width of the individual characters in a font, or an average of all the types in one font, not the gap between the characters which is the 'letter-spacing'.

A selection of readers' letters, an inside view of the PcW16 by Lee Jackson and some small ads fill the next few pages. Steve Denson expounds his views on the so-called 'dot.com' hysteria sweeping the financial markets, whilst Fred Manders continues his series on Logo, the oft forgotten programming language which comes free with your PCW. Dave Langford occupies the final page as was his wont in the days of *PcwPlus*

If you are really interested in the PCW then *PcwToday* should be on your shopping list. The subscription is £8.00 for four magazines, or £13.50 including a 3½" cover disc of public domain or shareware software. Contacts are:
