PcW16 Users Starter Pack

The Club has prepared a Starter Pack for users of the PcW16. This consists of two booklets: 'Using the PcW16-A Handbook for Beginners' and 'PcW16 Frequently Asked Questions'.

The first is sixteen pages of A5 written by Esther Welch. It explains each of the capabilities of the PcW16, the address book, the diary and alarm, word processing, etc. It gives examples of templates and advises on adding style to documents. It explains the various menus: insert, view and edit, and document menus.

There is an introduction to the spreadsheet and, exclusively, the Account Manager program written especially for the PcW16 by Creative Technology and the Inventory Master program from Comsoft. Other programs highlighted are John Elliott's CP/M Emulator for the PcW16 and John Cragg's Writers' Desk.

The second booklet is 24 A5 pages consisting of the text of the Questions and Answers file written by the Amstrad PcW16 Development Team. There is a lot of additional information and hints and tips which do not appear in the original manual. It explains the Word Match program and the Data List program which come free on the PcW16 Rescue Disc.

The Starter Pack is available to club members for £1.00 including p&p. The latest issue of the Rescue Disc, version 1.13, is available exclusively from the Club, also for £1.00 plus a PcW16 disc. Please send your cheque, made payable to the British Amstrad PCW Club, (and a disc for the Rescue Disc) to Mike Elliston, address as on front page. The club can not accept Postal Orders as the bank will not handle them, so please don't send them.

An Open Letter from the Committee

The Disc Drive operates a free exchange advertisement with PcwToday magazine; one whole page advertisement for the other magazine in each issue. This is because PcwToday is the only other magazine, devoted to the PCW user, available for readers and our members may find articles or advertisements in PcwToday which will be of use to them. The Club also receives a free copy of PcwToday for its archives and copies of the Disc Drive are sent in return. However, the Club is not affiliated to PcwToday nor does it publish it.

The following message is printed on the Contents page of each issue of the *Disc Drive*: "All advertisements in the *Disc Drive* are taken in good faith but the Club can not be held responsible for the quality of service or the goods provided by the advertisers or their agents".

Members of the Committee who are personal subscribers to *PcwToday* received their copy of issue 14, dated October 2000, in October or November last but without the cover disc (which is an extra subscription). This contains an apology for delays in publication and supply of the cover discs.

We are advised that Adrian Braddy, the publisher of *PcwToday*, had a car accident last year and that this may be the reason for the delays in supply of the cover disc, further issues of the magazine and replies to correspondence but are not in a position to add to this statement. PcW16 Files

The PcW16 uses the unique Rosanne Operating System rather than C/M or DOS, although it does use standard DOS HD discs to store your data (as well as in the cabinet). DOS stands for Disc Operating System and HD means High Density, ie 1.44 Mb as distinct from the earlier 720k DD discs, both used on PCs.

In order to save space in your cabinet PcW16 files are stored in a compressed format and they are also stored in this same compressed format on the floppy discs. Now the PcW16 disc format is simply a DOS disc with one directory name PCW and sub-directories off that named (by default) Folder1, Folder2, etc. This means that you can read files on a PcW16 disc in an IBM compatible PC (not a Mac).

Why is this so important? Well, one day your PcW16 is going to fail and I'm afraid that they are failing more and more often and no-one is prepared to repair them, at least not economically.

If you have saved all your life's work only in the cabinet of your PcW16, please save it to disc straight away! However, if you save it in the usual compressed PcW16 file standard, whilst a PC will be able to see the file it will not be able to untangle the compressed file. There are a number of ways around this that will allow a PC to read and understand a PcW16 file.

If it is a word processor document you can Export it as an ASCII 'plain text' file. This is just raw text, as would be output be a typewriter, with no bold, italic or font size information but may be all you need. Alternatively you can Export it as a Rich Text Format file which retains much of the formatting information and which most other PC word processors can retrieve.

Both of these are explained on page 68 of the Manual. Something which does not appear in the Manual but is in the Frequently Asked Questions file included on the latest Rescue Disc is that by use of Task+Shift+Blue you can save Word Processor files in an uncompressed format.

If what you have been writing over the last few years is important to you for the future, please save your work onto disc using one of the above three methods so that it can be retrieved on a PC at a later date when the PcW16 fails you. Leave it on the cabinet and it is lost forever. Leave it on a disc in the usual compressed format and it will be unintelligible.

If the work you wish to be able to rescue later is a spreadsheet then, as shown on page 103 of the manual, Export it as a CSV (Comma Separated Variable) file or as a DIF (Data Interchange Format) file. Both of these file formats can be read by most PC spreadsheet programs and, indeed, by SuperCalc II on a PCW. I recall when beta testing the original PcW16 that I had great trouble with one of these—it just hung and did nothing—so I recommend you to save the spreadsheet to the cabinet first and then export it to disc as both a CSV and a DIF file. That way one of them should be recoverable later.

Your Address Book can also be saved to a floppy disc as a CSV file as explained on page 119 of the manual although you could import it into a word processor document and then export the information as above.

There seems to be no way of saving the Diary or Calendar information in a form which could be retrieved on a PC for this is stored as an internal function so that the machine can be woken up to sound an alarm at the required moment, but maybe someone out there can comment further.
